### 1. INTRODUCTION

This Statement of Community Involvement has been compiled by specialist community consultation group Your Shout, part of Thorncliffe, on behalf of Galliford Try (the Applicant). This report supports a planning application for erecting a new school building for the Selwyn Primary School.

This report details the public consultation the Applicant has undertaken in order to inform the evolution of the proposals. Consultation has been carried out in accordance with national and regional policies, as set out in the following section of this report, and meets the requirements of the London Borough of Waltham Forest's current Statement of Community Involvement (adopted 2007).

Your Shout has also signed up to the Consultation Institute Charter, which sets out the best-practice principles for consultation. A copy of the charter can be found at <a href="https://www.consultationinstitute.org">www.consultationinstitute.org</a>.

The key aims of the pre-application stage of public consultation, which this report documents, were:

- 1. To inform local residents, businesses, councillors and other stakeholders about the redevelopment aspirations for the site.
- To gain a full understanding of local views of the proposals, engage with the local and wider community throughout the design development stage, and use these views to identify concerns and opportunities, and where possible inform the evolving final proposals.
- 3. To demonstrate how the Applicant has responded to the issues raised by the community and stakeholders and identify how changes have been made to the proposals to address them.

In addition, this report demonstrates the Applicant's continued commitment towards consultation and engagement throughout the statutory planning process.

### 2. POLICY FRAMEWORK

#### **National Context**

Pre-application consultation has long been seen as a positive process and a key part of ensuring local communities have a say in proposed developments. Many large scale planning applications are the subject of extensive pre-application consultation as a matter of course.

However, prior to the Localism Act 2011, there was no legal requirement for applicants to undertake any pre-application consultation with communities nearby.

The Localism Act 2011 introduced "a new requirement for developers to consult local communities before submitting planning applications for certain developments. This gives local people a chance to comment when there is still genuine scope to make changes to proposals... to further strengthen the role of local communities in planning." (A plain English guide to the Localism Act, p.13)

This amends the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 and creates several obligations for potential applicants. There is a requirement to carry out pre-application consultation for all "large scale major applications", and applicants must:

- Publicise the proposal and consult with residents in the vicinity of the site concerned.
- Give local people a chance to comment when there is still genuine scope to make changes to proposals.
- Have regard to the local planning authority about local good practice.
- Take account of responses to the consultation.

The Town and Country Planning (Development Management Procedure) (England) Order 2015 defines "major development" as involving any one or more of the following:

- a) The provision of dwelling houses where—
  - (i) The number of dwelling houses to be provided is 10 or more; or
  - (ii) The development is to be carried out on a site having an area of 0.5 hectares or more and it is not known whether the development falls within sub-paragraph (c)(i).
- b) The provision of a building or buildings where the floor space to be created by the development is 1,000 square metres or more; or
- c) Development carried out on a site having an area of 1 hectare or more.

However, it is best practice to consult stakeholders and the local community on all significant developments before a planning application is submitted.

Additionally the Government has used the Localism Act 2011 to clarify the rules on 'predetermination'. Previously in some cases councillors were warned off doing such things as campaigning, talking with constituents, or publicly expressing views on local issues, for fear of being accused of bias or facing legal challenge. The Localism Act 2011 makes it clear that it is proper for councillors to play an active part in discussions on developments prior to submission of a planning application, and that they should not be liable to legal challenge as a result. This will help them better represent their constituents and influence the development proposed.

The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF), published in March 2012, says that local planning authorities should work proactively with applicants to secure developments that improve the economic, social and environmental conditions of the area. The NPPF adds that "early engagement has significant potential to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the planning application system for all parties." (NPPF, p. 45, 118)

### **Regional Context**

The Mayor of London's 'London Plan' (adopted March 2015), does not directly advise on how developers should engage with local communities about proposed development. However, several sections relate to the principle of involving both residential and business communities in new development.

- 8.2 "The Mayor recognises the complexities of delivering new development in London, with a wide range of organisational, infrastructure and other issues that have to be considered. The most effective way of achieving delivery is to work together in a collaborative manner towards agreed goals. The Mayor is committed to engagement with all groups and individuals concerned with planning for London, including:
  - Government from national to local level.
  - Other public bodies/agencies.
  - Private businesses and trade/ representative bodies.
  - Voluntary and community sector groups.
- 8.4 The Mayor will work with boroughs, other agencies with planning responsibilities, enterprises and their organisations and other stakeholders to ensure that planning decisions are taken as close as to the communities and interests they affect, and in as inclusive a way, as is appropriate having regard to the planning system and the nature of the decision concerned. He recognises that community and voluntary groups, local business organisations and other interest groups have particular contributions to make to planning decisions, plans and strategies to shape neighbourhoods (see Policy 7.1 and paragraph 7.6) and will support their involvement. He will also consider what guidance and support it would be appropriate for him to offer to aid neighbourhood planning.
- 8.5 In the same way, the Mayor supports approaches to planning, regeneration and development that harness the knowledge, commitment and enthusiasm of local communities, enterprises and other groups. In particular, he will encourage use of tools such community land trusts, which enable communities to shape their own neighbourhoods through the management and development of land and other assets (including those transferred from public sector organisations). He recognises the importance of development trusts, other community organisations and local business partnerships and bodies in helping to shape and develop neighbourhoods, sometimes in ways that the public sector cannot."

#### **Local Context**

### London Borough of Waltham Forest Statement of Community Involvement (adopted 2007)

The following extracts indicate the local authority's approach to consultation. The consultation methodology compiled for the Selwyn Primary School Proposal has been tailored to meet these guidelines.

- "6.2.1 In accordance with the Localism Act 2011 and the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF), the Council encourages developers to give local people advance warning of their intention to apply for planning permission. The aim here is that the community are involved at the earliest possible stage before the developer firms up their proposals. This can often reduce the time taken to determine an application.
- 6.2.2 For small-scale development proposals, applicants should speak to nearby neighbours about their plans. For larger scale, or potentially controversial development proposals, the Council expects developers to engage with relevant stakeholders, including the local community and Ward Members. Effective techniques for more controversial schemes could include public exhibitions and workshops. The Planning Case Officer will advise the developer of the Council's expectations in terms of the level and scale of consultation expected for individual schemes, on the basis of site specific circumstances.
- 6.2.3 Developers will be asked to provide information on all community engagement they have undertaken on the proposal, along with an explanation of how issues raised have been taken into account. This information will be considered by the Council when determining the planning application."

### 3.SUMMARY OF PROPOSED APPLICATION


#### The current site

The application site comprises 0.96 ha (9 600 sq. m). It is bounded by Cavendish Road to the south, Selwyn Avenue to the north and residential properties off Halden Road to the east. The existing school buildings which form Selwyn Primary School are positioned immediately to the north and west of the site. The School falls within the administrative boundaries of Waltham Forest.

The site houses a mixed primary school and caters for 648 pupils aged between 3 and 11 years old. It was created by the amalgamation of Selwyn Infant and Junior Schools in April 2007. The school contains three Victorian buildings, originally dating from the early 1900's. Temporary mobile classrooms and a caretaker house are located on the western part of the site. The existing buildings are generally single storey in height with pitched roofs. The majority of the site contains hard surfaces, with a small soft play area located in the nature/ habitat area in the south-western part of the site. There is a level change of almost two metres between the north and the south of the site.

The main pedestrian access to the site is from Cavendish Road with secondary access for parents and pupils from Selwyn Avenue. There are two points of vehicular access on Cavendish Road and one point of vehicular access on Selwyn Avenue. These lead onto the school playground and are for emergency or grounds maintenance access only. There is no car park on the school site. There are 20 cycle parking spaces provided in the playgrounds of the school.

The site is located 630m from Highams Park national railstation. The nearest bus stop is located on Halden Road, 325m from the site. A site-specific PTAL assessment has identified the site as having a PTAL of 2, which is classified as poor public transport accessibility.

### The proposals

The project scope is to re-build Selwyn Primary School on the existing school site to provide a new 3FE primary school allowing for 691 students, a new 45 place nursery and provision for 16 under 3's. The redevelopment will include the full demolition of the existing school block to the North West of the site and the construction of a new 2 storey primary school in the demolished area while the school continues to function in the remaining existing buildings and a new temporary building. The remaining school buildings will then be demolished and landscaped into new hard and soft play areas. The new school and landscape play areas will then deliver a sustainable, safe and comfortable learning environment that will be able to support the needs to the school into the future.



### 4. THE CONSULTATION PROCESS

The consultation process for this scheme meets the requirements of the Council's Statement of Community Involvement. Specifically, we have:

- 1. Made sure the consultation takes place as early as practically possible in the design development process, and is therefore 'front-loaded'.
- 2. Conducted appropriate engagement that fits the community's needs.
- 3. Conducted an accessible and visible exhibition.
- 4. Used Plain English and adequate response mechanisms.
- 5. Explained clearly what the scope of the consultation is, and what can and cannot be changed.
- **6.** Analysed the results from the consultation objectively.
- 7. Publicised collective responses, with due regard to the Data Protection Act.
- **8.** Summarised how these responses have affected the proposals.
- **9.** Ensured feed-back, analysis and our response is available to the public and consultation participants.

#### Pre-application discussions with planning officers

A pre-application meeting has been undertaken with the London Borough of Waltham Forrest on November 20<sup>th</sup> 2015. Discussions have been ongoing for the duration of the pre-application period. Over the course of these discussions the design of the scheme has been refined. Detailed information about this process and the evolution of the design is included in the Design and Access Statement.

### **Pre-application meetings with Councillors**

We have been in close contact with our Hale End and Higham's Park ward councilors. Cllr Tony Bell attended our public consultation event. Another meeting will be held with local ward Councilors on 17<sup>th</sup> December.

### Pre-application discussions with individuals and groups

Prior to the public exhibition, we identified the community groups and other key stakeholders in the area of the application site, and built up a List of Stakeholders. We contacted individuals and community groups to invite them to the public exhibition, offer further information and to make them aware that we were happy to meet with them at a time of their convenience.


The community groups we contacted include:

We will continue to maintain contact with these individuals and groups as the planning application progresses.

### **Publicising the consultation**

We publicised the consultation to the residential units surrounding the Site by distributing an information leaflet. The objective of the leaflet was to invite the local community to the public exhibition, to communicate information about the scheme, and to seek feedback from those not able to attend the public exhibition. We delivered approximately 1000 copies of the leaflet, which were distributed by our in-house team to ensure correct delivery. The leaflet was delivered to all homes and businesses in the area highlighted in the map below. A copy of this leaflet is available in **Appendix 2**.

### Promoting the exhibition

Display posters advertising the public exhibition were distributed to several local shops and Selwyn Primary School. A copy of the display posters is available in Appendix 3

#### Conducting a visible and accessible public exhibition

The public exhibition took place on-site at Selwyn Primary School on December 3<sup>rd</sup> 2015 between 3pm and 7pm, with 66 people attending.

The times and date of the exhibition were chosen to encourage the maximum number of people to attend the exhibition, including those in full-time employment and those with parental responsibilities. We ensured the exhibition date did not fall on any locally observed religious or cultural festivals.

The venue was accessible to people with limited mobility. Play materials were available at the exhibition for young children. We prepared a feed back form for children, see **Appendix 1**, which included a drawings activity, an example of which can be seen in **Appendix 6**.

Posters were placed at the entrance of the exhibition so people could easily find it. Visitors had the opportunity to view six display panels containing details of the scheme, including site layout and details of the proposed development. Copies of the display panels are available in **Appendix 4**. Members of the project team were available to answer any questions visitors had about the plans and wore name badges to identify themselves. Representatives from each of the Applicant, the EFA, the architect, the planning consultant, the traffic consultant and Your Shout were present throughout the exhibition.

Visitors were encouraged to fill out a questionnaire during the public exhibition and some attendees also took the form away with them to fill in at home and return via Freepost. A copy of this form is available in **Appendix 5**.

#### Using appropriate response channels

We have maintained, and continue to maintain, several response mechanisms for the local community and stakeholders to give their feedback and comments about the scheme, including:

The feedback form contained information on how the responses provided would be used, which read as follows:

"Data will only be held by Your Shout and Galliford Try and a summary may be sent to London Borough of Waltham Forest. By giving us your details, you authorise us to send periodic updates about this site."

#### Quantitative and qualitative response mechanisms

The consultation included questions which allowed us to assess the response in a quantitative way.

The qualitative response was gathered from listening to individuals and groups in meetings, on the Freephone hotline, and at the public exhibition.

The feedback form asked for written comments about the scheme and the email service also gave an opportunity for people to send in written comments.

The quantitative and qualitative comments have been recorded and analysed objectively by team members from Your Shout.

### Feeding-back to participants and the wider community, and opportunities for continuing involvement

One of the main objectives of this Statement of Community Involvement is to help record individual and collective responses to the proposals and how these responses have affected our proposals.

This report also allows us to feed back this information, in a more readily digestible form to the local community, respondents, other stakeholders and councillors.

This Statement of Community Involvement will be made available, alongside other planning documents, as part of the planning submission to the London Borough of Waltham Forest.

The Freephone, Freepost, email address and website will all be maintained until the planning application is determined by the local planning authority.

We remain committed to keeping in touch with local groups, individuals and all those that have participated throughout this consultation exercise. We will be available to meet consultees again as appropriate.



### **5.THE RESPONSE TO THE CONSULTATION**




## Do you support these proposals to provide new school buildings for Selwyn Primary?



#### Qualitative response

People who attended the exhibition, recipients of the leaflet and other local residents had the opportunity to provide qualitative responses to our consultation. These responses have been collected and collated and this will continue throughout the application process. The main points raised are outlined below, along with details of how the Applicant has responded to each comment. A total of **59** people left comments. The full comments received are included in **Appendix 7**.

### Summary of key points and how we have responded to these comments

The feedback received covered a number of themes; the most frequent are displayed below:



### Design / Appearance

A number of consultees expressed concern about the appearance of the proposed buildings.

"Please consider aesthetics in the outdoor space too. Exterior cladding?

"It should be the best contemporary architecture and its' facade should appeal to local people. I support a contemporary build of high architectural standards."

In response to the comments received the team have developed their designs for the exterior of the building. The cladding specification has been developed to be more in keeping with the surrounding area.

#### **Demolition of Existing Building**

Some members of the local community who came to the exhibition and contacted us via Freepost and Freephone commented that the existing building should be retained and renovated:

"I would like the exterior to remain Victorian Architecture."

"Would prefer the building to keep its history the way it looks at the moment."

"Do not agree with knocking down the beautiful school building."

However parents and staff at the school as well as local residents did recognise the existing building is in a desperate state of disrepair:

"Both of our children attend the school and it desperately needs modernising."

"The building is in a very bad state of disrepair."

The current school buildings would need extensive renovations to keep the building functional. It has therefore been deemed that the existing building is no longer viable to maintain. Renovation works would also cause extended disruption to students and teachers. The new building will bring the learning facilities up to modern standards and the proposals will offer the opportunity for hugely improved outdoor play space for the children.

### **Disruption during Construction**

Throughout the consultation, local residents, students and teachers have asked questions about the construction process, and the levels of disturbance involved.

"As a local resident I am concerned about heavy machinery, building and construction goods being delivered"

"Hope the works will not be a naissance to the neighbours!"

There will inevitably be some noise during the construction phase. Galliford Try, the specialist contractors are very experienced in utilising phased building programs in order to keep schools open during improvement works and to keep disruption to local neighbours to an absolute minimum.

Galliford Try are members of the Considerate Constructors Scheme and will provide a helpline number for assistance, complaints etc. Local residents businesses will be kept informed of activities on site through the distribution of regular newsletters.

#### **Increase in Student Numbers**

Local residents raised concerns that the new development would involve an increase in student numbers, and thus more traffic to local roads.

"Concerned if there will be in increase of pupils and therefore increase in traffic."

"My only concerns would be the amount of more traffic, including large deliveries to the school."

The school will not be increasing its student role, and as such it is not expected that there will be any increase in traffic caused by the proposals. At the present time there are 0 parking spaces provided on site. 4 places are proposed for the new school buildings, so the parking situation should be improved from the existing situation.

Our application will be accompanied by detailed reports on the effects on local roads. As part of the application the team will be writing a school travel plan, for the consideration of council planning officers and TFL.

### 6.SUMMARY AND CONTINUED CONSULTATION

The Applicant has undertaken public consultation to ensure local stakeholders have had an opportunity to comment on the emerging proposals in advance of submission.

A list of key stakeholders has been put together to ensure that all interested parties have been kept informed of the plans and given a chance to ask questions and give feedback. This list included, but was not limited to, stakeholder groups that were suggested by the London Borough of Waltham Forest planning officers. Where information has been requested, it has been supplied in an easy to understand way.

The applicant held a public exhibition of the proposals on December 3<sup>rd</sup> 2015. The public exhibitions were well advertised with the delivery of information leaflets to the local area. Key stakeholders and councillors were notified with an email invitation. In total, 66 attended to view the plans in person.

The public exhibitions consisted of information panels that gave a clear indication of the proposals. Members of the Applicant's professional team were in attendance to answer any questions. A wide variety of ways to respond to the public consultation were available. Feedback could be given by using the Feedback form, Freephone number, a freepost address and a dedicated email address.

The key local stakeholders and councillors were contacted prior to the public exhibitions and have been given the chance to engage since.

This Statement of Community Involvement fully demonstrates the Applicant's commitment to thorough and meaningful public consultation and meets the requirements set out by London Borough of Waltham Forest. The submission of the planning application does not mark the end of this consultation and the Applicant will continue to meet with local groups and individuals as appropriate throughout this process.







	In contrast, the new buildings around the Olympic park (which look exactly the same as the one proposed to replace Selwyn school) already look tattered and cheaply made in the short time they've been standing. The new building proposed by Galliford Try looks cheap to build, quick to degenerate and have no classical features or embellishments. In short, it looks like a brown box.
	The governing body for the school explained that he would prefer the facade of the school to remain the same and for the interior to be refurbished. I agree with this whole heartedly and think it a much better solution. But the contractor explained that it is cheaper to pull down and replace the entire school then to do this. I find this hard to believe. He also admitted that the public exhibition was mostly a formality and that planning permission will go ahead. I love the community here so this admission that what residents think doesn't count for much is upsetting. The school's governing body was disappointed that he only had a small choice of exteriors to choose from within the confines of the EFA's budget. All of which, he said will weather badly and deteriorate the area.
	To match the wow factor of the school's new inside, the outside should also become an architectural project. Parts could be modernised whilst making a feature of the original building.
	My house will face directly across the playground to the front of the new building. I am extremely upset that someone would consider pulling down this part of London's history forever. I certainly would not have bought my property had I known that the school would be replaced. London areas
